




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



Establishing the Post-War International Order, 1944-1961

Study the institutions, treaties, and events that shaped the post-war world, from Bretton Woods to the Berlin Wall

This collection, curated in association with the **National Archives (UK)**, provides an unparalleled insight into the political, economic, and military foundations of the post-war international order.

The materials, which are diverse in nature, cover a wide range of subject matter, shedding light on the perspectives of various state and non-state actors during periods of both cooperation and conflict. The **United Nations (UN)**, **Marshall Plan**, **World Bank**, **International Monetary Fund (IMF)**, **General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT)**, **North Atlantic Treaty Organisation (NATO)**, and **European Economic Community (EEC)**, to name but a few examples, are all accounted for.

In addition to diplomatic files relating to key organisations, agreements, and events, records of global commodity prices, including gold, oil, and food, feature heavily.

Most of the documents are derived from the annals of the **British Board of Trade (i.e. BT 64)**, **Cabinet Office (i.e. CAB 128)**, **Foreign Office (i.e. FO 371)**, and **Treasury (i.e. T 274)**.

Brought together here for the first time, these files are intended for use by academics working across the humanities and social sciences, from History and International Relations to Economics and International Law.

Colonial Africa in Official Statistics, 1821-1953

Study over a century of British colonial rule in Africa through official government statistics

The late nineteenth century ‘Scramble for Africa’ saw European colonial powers carve up the African continent between themselves.

The United Kingdom controlled the largest portion of territory, with its Colonial Regulations requiring an ‘**Annual Blue Book**’ to be submitted from each colony to the **British Colonial Office**. The Blue Book was an attempt to standardise statistical reports, primarily covering economic development as well as demographic, ecclesiastical, and public records.

This collection contains Blue Books and other archival material from 13 British colonies and protectorates in Africa compiled during the period 1821-1953.

The standardised nature of the Blue Books enables comparisons to be drawn geographically (between colonies) and over time on issues from the slave trade and colonial economic practice to education and public health.

The materials are accompanied by two contextual essays: one by **Professor Erik Green** on European settler agriculture and exploitation of local labour in colonial Africa; and another by **Dr. Felix Meier zu Selhausen** on the origins and consequences of Christian missionary activities on the continent.

Prosecuting the Holocaust: British Investigations into Nazi Crimes, 1944-1949

Bringing Nazis to justice and giving victims a voice

During the Second World War, the Nazi state was responsible for the systematic enslavement and extermination of millions of Jews.

Other groups, such as Russian prisoners of war, Slavs, Sinti and Romani, homosexuals, the disabled, and political opponents of the regime were also targeted. After Germany's surrender, Allied forces established a series of military tribunals, known as the Nuremberg Trials, to bring the architects and perpetrators of these crimes to justice.

Drawn from **The National Archives (UK)** and **United States Holocaust Memorial Museum**, this collection contains a wealth of information regarding the British government's efforts to investigate and

prosecute Nazi crimes during the period 1944-1949. The evidence gathered sheds light on almost every aspect of the Holocaust, from the concentration camp system to the mass murder of the “incurably sick” in psychiatric hospitals. More importantly, it gives a voice to the victims of these atrocities, many of whom testified about their experiences immediately after the war.

The files include materials from the **WO 309** (War Office: Judge Advocate General's Office; British Army of the Rhine War Crimes Group), **WO 311** (War Office: Judge Advocate General's Office; Military Deputy's Department), and **WO 235** (War Office: Judge Advocate General's Office; War Crimes Case Files) series.

Apartheid Through the Eyes of South African Political Parties, 1948-1994

Apartheid was a system of white minority rule that prevailed in South Africa for much of the 20th century. This collection contains various materials published by political parties on both sides of the racial and ideological divide.

BBC Handbooks, Annual Reports and Accounts, 1927-2002

This collection contains handbooks, annual reports and accounts published by the British Broadcasting Corporation (BBC) between 1927 and 2002

BBC Listener Research Department Reports, 1937-c.1950

This collection contains Audience Research Reports compiled by the British Broadcasting Corporation's (BBC) Listener Research Department (LRD) between 1937 and 1950.

7 British Government Information and Propaganda, 1939-2009

The Central Office of Information (COI) was a British government department established in 1946 as the successor to the wartime Ministry of Information (MOI).

8 British Labour Party Papers, 1906-1969

The Labour Party was founded in 1900 to represent the interests of trade unions and working-class voters. In political terms, it has often been characterised as a “broad church”, encompassing a range of left and centre-left viewpoints.

Containing 6,671 pages belonging to 38 documents housed in 7 volumes.



9 British Officers' Diaries from World War 1, 1914-1919

The First World War involved soldiers of different ranks as well as non-combatants. A range of these diaries are included in this collection. The diaries reveal what life was like for the average British soldier in the Battle of the Somme and later battles of Ypres.

Containing 13,214 pages belonging to 38 documents housed in 5 volumes.

Part of British Online Archives' Politics and Protest series, the resources contained within this collection chart the rise and fall of fascism in Britain during the 1930s and 1940s, with a particular focus on Oswald Mosley's blackshirt movement.

Containing 14,285 pages belonging to 25 documents housed in 10 volumes.



Colonial Law in Africa, 1920-1945

Originally known as the 'Government Gazettes', each item contains the colonial laws for the year they were published. The legal records also include property for sale, probate records and bankruptcy notices. This is the second part of the three part series 'Colonial Law in Africa'.

Containing 144,428 pages belonging to 307 documents housed in 13 volumes.

Colonial Law in Africa, 1920-1945

These gazettes contain copies of the laws and ordinances which were introduced in the years they cover. Each item was originally published as the Government Gazette for a colony and year. Their contents include tenders of property, probate records and insolvency notices.

Containing 197,084 pages belonging to 103 documents housed in 12 volumes.





Communisms and the Cold War, 1944-1986

This collection contains reports and other records compiled by the Communist Party of Great Britain's (CPGB) International Department between 1944 and 1986—a period which begins immediately after the dissolution of the Communist International (Comintern) and ends shortly before the collapse of the Soviet Union.

Containing 16,959 pages belonging to 33 documents housed in 10 volumes.



Life under Nazi Rule: Reports by Anti-Fascists in Occupied Europe, 1933-1945

This collection contains two newsletters published by the Internationale Transportarbeiter-Föderation/ International Transport Workers' Federation (ITF), a pan-European trade union, between 1933 and 1945.

Containing 2,016 pages belonging to 17 documents housed in 2 volumes.



Military Intelligence Files: Land, Sea & Air, 1938-1974

Part of British Online Archives's wide-ranging World Wars series, the resources contained within this collection shed light on the activities and attitudes of British military intelligence agencies during the Second World War and Cold War.

Containing 73,344 pages belonging to 23 documents housed in 12 volumes.

Paris Peace Conference and Beyond, 1919-1939

The Paris Peace Conference was a meeting of Allied diplomats that took place in the aftermath of the First World War. Its purpose was to impose peace terms on the vanquished Central Powers and establish a new international order.

Containing 52,343 pages belonging to 57 documents housed in 9 volumes.

Records from Bethlem Royal Hospital, 1559-1932

Bethlem Royal Hospital is a psychiatric facility in London. It was established as a priory of the Order of St Mary of Bethlehem in 1247, before beginning to care for mentally ill patients sometime in the 14th century.

Secrecy, Sabotage, and Aiding the Resistance

When the British and American security services went to war together, their targets included morale, supplies and governments. Sabotage training and supplying rebels in occupied countries weakened the enemy.

This collection contains a series of American Journals, magazines, and trade papers published in the United Kingdom and continental Europe from 1768 to 1925—a period that encompasses everything from the Boston Tea Party to the First World War.

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
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
